SAIL Report to IAMSLIC Board On SAIL Activities for 2004

This was a busy and productive year for SAIL (Southeast Affiliate of IAMSLIC). The major activity was the annual meeting. Year-long activities included using the discussion list for resource sharing among members, recruiting conference meeting hosts, recruiting new members, and updating the SAIL directory.

SAIL has 56 individual and 11 corporate members listed in the SAIL Directory found on the SAIL web page <u>http://www.mrl.cofc.edu/.</u> During the business meeting at SAIL 2003, members discussed expanding the geographic area for SAIL and voted to expand and include the northeast Atlantic states. As a result, we are recruiting members from that expanded area.

SAIL 2004 Conference

The 14th Annual SAIL Conference was held May 11-14, 2004, at the University of Texas Marine Science Institute, Port Aransas, and at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. Liz DeHart at UTMSI and Densis Landry-Hyde at TAMU-CC were the hosts. The conference theme was *Getting More with Less, How to be Lean and Mean Machines in Sustainable Seas*. SAIL was awarded a \$1,000 grant from the IAMSLIC Executive Board to help defray the cost of hosting the regional conference. SAIL would like to extend thanks again for receiving the grant.

The MSI van was not needed to transport attendees from Port Aransas to Corpus Christi on the last day of the conference because there was a sufficient number of personal vehicles available. The monies that would have been spent on using the van were used for the above-mentioned expenses.

The conference packets included a program, featuring a variety of topics and speakers from the two campuses and from attendees, covering deep-sea divers in the Gulf of Mexico, grey literature about migrant labor in the seafood industry, growing fish in captivity, virtual reference, and e-journal management. The keynote speaker was the well known deep-sea researcher, Dr. Sylvia Earl, who had the attendees spell bound during the course of her talk on deep-dives in the Gulf. There were five science presentations, eight library presentations or round table/panel

discussions, and a G.I.S. hands-on workshop that was geared toward science and library-related issues. Unfortunately, the field trip was cancelled because of a horrendous accident on the freeway.
